









George Psacharopoulos (1937-)



Short Biography & Significant Contribution

Over the course of his career, George Psacharopoulos has made a deep impact on the way education is viewed in relation to economics and developing nations. Psacharopoulos was born in 1937 in Athens, Greece. He obtained a B.A. degree in 1960 in his home country before coming to the U.S. for graduate school. He received both his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in economics from the University of Chicago in 1964 and 1968, respectively. Early on, Psacharopoulos took an interest in the economics of education, particularly in the returns of education across various nations. His conception of how investment in education can be approached has helped shape and influence research studies and policy formation, especially as they relate to developing nations. Psacharopoulos' use of human capital theory and his focus on the macro planning of education has been an integral part of his work and scholarship. He views human capital development through education as a means to a more productive society. Psacharopoulos contends that economics is an integral utility in the process of educational planning, particularly because it may guide planners in determining resource allocation in determining the optimal means for efficient and effective school systems. In 2003, the *Economics of Education Review* dedicated an entire issue in honor of Psacharopoulos and the significance of his academic endeavors.

Curious George: the enduring Psacharopoulos legacy on the economics of education in developing countries

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
1. Introduction

The idea of writing a *festschrift* for someone who is still active as a scholar, policy adviser and mentor might seem curious. It's somewhat akin to celebrating a victory just after halftime of a football game. But George Psacharopoulos is nothing if not a curious individual. First, as with most serious scholars, George's intellectual curiosity knows no bounds. While head of education research at the World Bank, George would chasten eager (then) young pups like ourselves looking for extra resources by saying: 'We don't lack budget; we lack new ideas!' Second, unlike most serious scholars, George's main preoccupation was to see how much impact his

interest. We fear that George continues to be so prolific and there is already so much to celebrate that we would not be up to the Herculean task of writing a brief introduction if we waited any longer. It's better to pay-asyou-go, even if it is only halftime.

2. In the service of development

We know George best from his time at the World Bank. We were among those he recruited from university and public sector settings (including many of those who are contributing to this volume) to bring analytical rigor into policy formulation in education.
